## Agatha Christie and Hercule Poirot: The Greatest Mystery Writer and the Greatest Fictional Detective of All Time?

"Mes amis, we have cause for celebration." So begins Mark Aldridge's Agatha Christie's Poirot: The Greatest Detective in the World, an essential guide to all things Poirot. It begins with Agatha Christie's and Hercule Poirot's first book, *The Mysterious Affair at Styles*, published first in the United States in 1920. Aldridge's book—and two other must-read books, David Suchet's memoir, Poirot and Me, and Agatha Christie Goes to War, an anthology of scholarly essays edited by Rebecca Mills and J. C. Bernthal—pay tribute to aspects of Christie's century of literary success.

Although still holding all-time records for sales and books translated, as well as stage,

Marty S. A past Popular Culture Association president, she has published articles on film, gender issues, mysteries, and especially Agatha Christie.
